## AFRICAN MASK DISPLAY

Come early to the December 10<sup>th</sup> meeting to see the African masks brought for display by Mr. Bob Dickson. Mr. Dickson is a geographer who went to school at Kalamazoo College in Michigan. He spent his junior year at Fourah Bay College in Freetown, Sierra Leone. He traveled in Gambia, Nigeria, Ghana, and Ivory Coast collecting data for his senior thesis on economic geography that dealt with the political influences and implications of iron mining and the construction of a steel plant. After finishing the coursework for his masters degree at Michigan he spent two years teaching as the Senior Geography Master at a boy's secondary school in Zaria, Nigeria. One of his professors at Fourah Bay became his Ph.D. advisor at Kent. He owns 20-25 masks, and will bring about ten to show at the December 10<sup>th</sup> pre-meeting.
